AFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – 1960 Houston 24, Los Angeles Chargers 16 January 1, 1961 • Jeppesen Stadium

One sensational play by rookie halfback Billy Cannon, the previous season's Heisman Trophy winner, was the difference, as the Houston Oilers defeated the Los Angeles Chargers 24-16 in the first AFL Championship game. The Chargers took the early lead on two field goals by Ben Agajanian, but QB George Blanda brought the Oilers back, throwing a 17-yard touchdown pass to Dave Smith and kicking an 18-yard field goal, which put Houston ahead 10-9 at halftime. The teams exchanged touchdowns in the third quarter, with Blanda throwing a seven-yard scoring pass to Bill Groman and Chargers halfback Paul Lowe pounding over from the 2.

Protecting a one-point lead in the fourth quarter and facing a third-and-nine at the Houston 12, Blanda threw a short pass to Cannon, who broke a tackle and outran the Chargers' secondary to complete an 88-yard scoring play. In the final minute of the game, the Chargers drove down the field, reaching the Houston 22. However, the Oilers held on fourth down for the title.

AFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – 1961 Houston 10, San Diego Chargers 3 Dec. 24, 1961 • Balboa Stadium

The Houston Oilers defeated the San Diego Chargers 10-3 to win their second consecutive AFL title. In a game marked by turnovers, Houston had seven and San Diego six. The only score of the first half came on a 46-yard field goal by George Blanda, which followed a nine-yard San Diego punt. In the third quarter, the Oilers put together the only sustained drive of the game, moving 80 yards. With a third-and-five at the San Diego 35, Blanda rolled to his right and found Billy Cannon open at the 17. Cannon jumped to make the catch, shrugged off a would-be tackler, and motored into the end zone for a touchdown that put Houston up 10-0. The Chargers scored early in the fourth quarter on a 12-yard field goal by George Blair, but they could not get on the scoreboard again.

AFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – 1962
Dallas 20, Houston 17 (2 OT)
Dec. 23, 1962 • Jeppesen Stadium

In what was at the time the longest game in the history of professional football, the Dallas Texans dethroned the two-time defending AFL champion Houston Oilers when Tommy Brooker kicked a 25-yard field goal after 2:54 of the sixth quarter, or 17:54 of sudden-death overtime. The Texans led 17-0 after two quarters, but the Oilers, tied it up with 17 second-half points. The overtime started with a potentially damaging gaffe by Dallas captain Abner Haynes, who had already scored twice, but who won the toss and then elected to 'kick to the clock'. What Haynes wanted was the strong wind behind his team, but, by saying kick first, it gave the Oilers the chance to decide which end to take, and, needless to say, chose to have the wind behind them. As it turned out, it didn't matter. After an interception near the end of the first overtime period, the Texans took over. Two big plays by fullback Jack Spikes put the ball at the Houston 19, and, on fourth-and-nine, Brooker ended the contest.

Big plays before and after halftime broke open a tight game, as the Raiders won their first AFL title with a 40-7 victory against Houston. The Raiders led 10-0 in the final minutes of the half, the big play a 69-yard touchdown run by Hewritt Dixon. The Raiders lined up for a field goal attempt from the Houston 17, but instead quarterback Daryle Lamonica took the snap and threw to a wide open Dave Kocourek for a touchdown with 18 seconds remaining to build the lead to 17-0. The Oilers hoped for a big play to open the second half, and they got it, but it was in favor of the Raiders. Zeke Moore fumbled the kickoff and Oakland recovered deep in Houston territory, leading to Lamonica's one-yard quarterback sneak. In the next two quarters, George Blanda kicked three field goals, to give him 16 points for the day, and Lamonica threw a touchdown pass to Bill Miller.

Oakland scored four touchdowns in 4:22 of the first quarter, as the Raiders jumped to a quick 28-0 lead on the way to a 56-7 victory over the Oilers. The key figure was quarterback Daryle Lamonica, who threw six touchdown passes. On their second possession, the Raiders moved 50 yards in five plays, with Lamonica throwing a 13-yard scoring pass to Fred Biletnikoff. On the first play after the kickoff, George Atkinson intercepted Pete Beathard's pass and returned it 57 yards for a score. The Oilers again lost the ball the first play after the kickoff, as Hoyle Granger fumbled and Carleton Oats recovered at the Houston 24. On first down, Lamonica hit Rod Sherman for a touchdown. Following the next kickoff, Houston again fumbled - this time by Beathard on the fourth play - and Tom Keating recovered. Again it took the Raiders one play to score, Lamonica finding Biletnikoff for the touchdown.

The Oilers, making their first postseason appearance since 1969, advanced to the divisional playoffs on a brilliant passing performance by Dan Pastorini, who completed 20 of 29 passes for 306 yards and one touchdown. The two AFC wild card teams were locked in a 7-7 tie until midway through the fourth quarter. But Pastorini then completed all four of his passes in a 53-yard drive that set up Toni Fritsch's 35-yard field goal for a 10-7 lead with 7:25 left. One play after the ensuing kickoff, Gregg Bingham intercepted a Bob Griese pass and the Oilers drove 50 yards in 10 plays (9 on the ground) for Earl Campbell's clinching touchdown from the one-yard line. Griese completed 11 of 28 passes. Campbell, the NFL's leading rusher during regular season with 1,450 yards, gained 84 yards on 26 carries.

Houston captured its second straight postseason road victory and advanced into its first AFC championship game with an impressive win over New England, the AFC East champion. After a scoreless first period, Pastorini hit wide receiver Ken Burrough on a 71-yard touchdown pass and connected with tight end Mike Barber on 19- and 13-yard touchdown strikes. New England narrowed the gap to 24-14 early in the final quarter on two scoring passes: a 24-yard option toss from running back Andy Johnson to wide receiver Harold Jackson and another 24-yard pass from backup quarterback Tom Owen to tight end Russ Francis. Linebacker Gregg Bingham's 19-yard interception return to New England's 18-yard line with 5:07 remaining stopped the Patriots' rally and set up running back Earl Campbell's two-yard touchdown run three plays later.

AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – 1978

Playing in their first championship game since 1962, the Oilers were unable to unseat a strong Pittsburgh team, dropping a 34-5 contest at Three Rivers Stadium. The Steelers, striking through cold, steady rain for 31 first half points, won their third AFC championship in five years behind their usual solid defense and spectacular performances by Terry Bradshaw and Lynn Swann. Seventeen of the points, came during a 48-second span in the last minute of the half as Pittsburgh capitalized on two fumbles by Ronnie Coleman and one by Johnnie Dirden. Despite the playing conditions that contributed to a postseason record 12 fumbles, Bradshaw completed 11 of 19 passes for 200 yards and touchdowns to John Stallworth and Swann, who caught four passes for 98 yards. Both touchdown passes and one of Roy Gerela's two field goals made up the 17-point burst between 14:08 and 14:56 of the second quarter after Pittsburgh had built a 14-3 lead on scoring runs by Franco Harris and Rocky Bleier.

AFC WILD CARD PLAYOFF GAME – 1979 Houston 13, Denver 7 December 23, 1979 • Astrodome

The Oilers, playing a postseason game at home for the first time in 17 years, advanced to the divisional playoffs by shutting out the Broncos over the last three quarters of play. Denver marched 80 yards for a touchdown and a 7-3 lead on its first possession, but Earl Campbell's three-yard scoring run gave Houston a 10-7 halftime margin. Campbell and Oilers quarterback Dan Pastorini both missed second half action with groin injuries but Rob Carpenter and second year quarterback Gifford Nielsen played well in relief during their initial NFL playoff competition. Linebacker Gregg Bingham's 15-yard interception return set up Toni Fritsch's second field goal- a 20-yarder with 4:18 remaining to give Houston a 13-7 edge. The Oilers' defense, which recorded six sacks overall, held the Broncos on the final two series with Curley Culp's third-down sack and Vernon Perry's fourth-down pass deflection the key plays.

Nielsen, making his first NFL postseason start, completed a 47-yard scoring pass to Mike Renfro with 12:55 elapsed in the third period to provide the winning margin.

The Steelers held the Oilers to only 24 rushing yards but were also aided by a controversial non-touchdown call to come away with a 27-13 win. Houston jumped to a 7-0 lead just 2:30 into the game when Vernon Perry returned an interception 75 yards for a touchdown. Then after both teams exchanged field goals, Terry Bradshaw completed two touchdown passes, a 16-yarder to tight end Billy Cunningham and a 20-yard score to wide receiver John Stallworth. With the Steelers leading 17-10, the controversial play occurred during the last seconds of the third quarter. Quarterback Dan Pastorini threw a pass to Mike Renfro at the back of the end zone, and Renfro appeared to have caught it for a touchdown with both feet in bounds before he fell out of the end zone. However, the officials ruled the pass incomplete. Although the Oilers protested, and replays would later show that it was inconclusive, they had to settle for a 23-yard field goal. The Steelers would then score 10 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to clinch the victory.

He picked off Ken Stabler's pass in the end zone to end a Houston scoring threat in the third period. In the fourth quarter Hayes' 20-yard interception return capped the Raiders' scoring.

Oilers kicker Tony Zendejas atoned for a fourth-quarter 29-yard field goal miss by converting a 42-yarder 8:05 into overtime to help Houston advance to the divisional playoffs for the first time since 1980. Quarterback Warren Moon completed 21 of 32 passes for 273 yards and one touchdown in his initial NFL playoff game. Drew Hill and Ernest Givins combined for 13 catches for 173 yards, including six for 71 on third downs. Wide receiver Willie Drewrey's first NFL touchdown catch, a 29-yarder, gave the Oilers a 20-13 lead in the third quarter. However, Seattle quarterback Dave Krieg hit wide receiver Steve Largent on a 12-yard scoring pass in the final 1:47 to tie the score and send the game into overtime. Houston held a 47:44 to 20:21 time-of-possession advantage over Seattle and outgained the Seahawks 437 yards to 250.

Kay also caught a one-yarder in the second quarter for the first two-touchdown game of his four-year career. Elway, who completed 14 of 25 passes for 259 yards, scored on a three-yard run with 4:23 remaining to seal the win.

Then, Buffalo started the comeback, advancing 50 yards to score on Davis' 1-yard touchdown run to cut the deficit to 35-10. After a recovered onside kick by the Bills which led to a touchdown, and a 26-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Andre Reed, the lead was trimmed to 35-24. On the Oilers' ensuing possession, Bills safety Henry Jones intercepted a pass from Moon which led to another touchdown pass from Reich to Reed. Kicker Al Del Greco attempted a field goal to increase the Oilers' lead, but the snap was fumbled. The Bills then scored on a 17-yard touchdown pass, taking the lead 38-35 with three minutes remaining in the game. A last minute drive ending in a 26-yard field goal from Del Greco would send the game into overtime. Early in overtime, Bills defensive back Nate Odomes intercepted a pass from Moon, setting up Steve Christie's 32-yard game-winning field goal.

Joe Montana threw three second-half touchdown passes, including two just 54 seconds apart in the fourth quarter, to rally the Chiefs past the Oilers. Houston, which entered the game with an 11-game winning streak, jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the opening quarter and still led 13-7 after Al Del Greco's 43-yard field goal with 9:37 remaining in the fourth quarter. But Kansas City marched 71 yards in only 59 seconds, the key play a 38-yard pass interference penalty against Oilers cornerback Cris Dishman, to take the lead for the first time on Montana's 11-yard touchdown pass to J.J. Birden. On the next play from scrimmage, Chiefs linebacker Derrick Thomas sacked Warren Moon, forcing a fumble that defensive tackle Dan Saleaumua recovered at the Oilers' 12-yard line. On third down, Montana's 18-yard touchdown pass to Willie Davis put Kansas City ahead 21-13 with 7:44 left. Houston drove 80 yards to a touchdown to pull within one point with 3:45 to go, but Marcus Allen's 21-yard touchdown run at the 1:55 mark sealed the Oilers' fate.

One of the most memorable finishes in NFL playoff history gave the Titans the franchise's first playoff win since 1991, a 22-16 stunner over the visiting Buffalo Bills. After Steve Christie kicked a 41-yard field goal to give Buffalo a 16-15 lead with 16 seconds remaining, Kevin Dyson returned a Frank Wycheck lateral on the ensuing kickoff 75 yards for a touchdown with three seconds left in the game. The play, quickly dubbed as the "Music City Miracle," gave Tennessee a 22-16 lead that turned into a victory after Buffalo's last-ditch hopes for a matching return touchdown were thwarted. Eddie George paced Tennessee's offense with a 29-carry, 106-yard performance. The victory, in front of a franchise-record crowd at Adelphia Coliseum, allowed the franchise to advance to the AFC Divisional Playoffs for the first time since 1993. The Titans took a 12-0 lead into intermission, but the Bills stormed back behind two touchdowns from Antowain Smith that gave Buffalo a 13-12 lead with 11:08 remaining. Al Del Greco's 36-yard field goal gave the Titans a 15-13 lead with 1:48 remaining, setting up the game's final dramatic moments.

Eddie George ran for a franchise play-off-record 162 yards and a touchdown as the Tennessee Titans advanced to their first AFC Championship Game since 1979 with a 19-16 victory over the Indianapolis Colts at the RCA Dome. George's 68-yard touchdown run on the first drive of the third quarter gave the Titans the lead for good, and Tennessee's defense held rookie standout Edgerrin James to only 56 yards rushing on 20 carries. Al Del Greco set franchise post-season records for field goals in a game and a career, kicking two of his four field goals in each half to give him 11 for his career. Indiana native Blaine Bishop led the inspired Tennessee defense with 11 tackles and two passes defended, and the defensive unit as a whole held Peyton Manning in check, with the second-year signal caller completing only 19 of 43 passes for 227 yards in the loss. The Colts pulled within three points with 1:51 remaining on Manning's 15-yard TD run, but Yancey Thigpen sealed Tennessee's victory by recovering Danny Knight's ensuing onside kick.

AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – 1999 Tennessee 33, Jacksonville 14 January 23, 2000 • Alltel Stadium

The Titans advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history by defeating the Jacksonville Jaguars for the third time in the same season, 33-14, at Alltel Stadium. Steve McNair ran for 91 yards and two second-half touchdowns, combining with Eddie George for 177 yards rushing on the afternoon. The Titans' defense turned in a dominant performance, forcing six Jacksonville turnovers, including two fumbles and two interceptions from Mark Brunell. Jacksonville led 14-7 on a 33-yard TD run by James Stewart. But the Titans then scored 26 unanswered points, including an Al Del Greco 34-yard field goal that cut the Jaguar lead to 14-10 at halftime. McNair scored on a 1-yard run with 9:24 remaining in the third quarter, and after Mark Brunell was dropped for a safety, Derrick Mason ran the ensuing free kick 80 yards for a touchdown. McNair scored his second touchdown of the game with seven minutes remaining, sealing the 33-14 outcome. The win gave the Titans their first AFC Championship since the AFL-NFL merger, and advanced them to Super Bowl XXXIV against St. Louis.

SUPER BOWL XXXIV – 1999 St. Louis 23, Tennessee 16 January 30, 2000 • Georgia Dome

The Titans' magical season ended at the Georgia Dome, as receiver Kevin Dyson was stopped just short of the goal line on the game's last play by Rams linebacker Mike Jones in a 23-16 St. Louis victory. The play ended an inspired two-minute drive led by Steve McNair, who broke Super Bowl records for rushing yards by a quarterback in both one game and one play for the Titans. The Rams held a 9-0 lead at halftime, extending their lead to 16-0 on a nine yard TD reception by Torry Holt with 7:20 left in the third quarter. The Titans charged back on two touchdowns runs by Eddie George, and tied the score at 16 on a 43-yard Al Del Greco field goal with 2:12 remaining. On the first play of the ensuing drive, Isaac Bruce broke free and scored on a 73-yard touchdown pass from Kurt Warner, giving the Rams a seven-point advantage. McNair then led a 12-play, 87-yard drive that culminated in the completion to Dyson. McNair's prolific day included 64 yards rushing. George, meanwhile, rushed for 95 yards to become the Titans' career playoff rushing leader.

The Baltimore Ravens used big plays on defense and special teams to advance to the AFC Championship Game with a 24-10 victory over the Tennessee Titans at Adelphia Coliseum. Anthony Mitchell returned a blocked Al Del Greco field goal attempt 90 yards for a touchdown to break a 10-10 tie, and NFL Defensive Player of the Year Ray Lewis returned an interception 50 yards for a touchdown to seal Baltimore's win with 6:41 remaining in the fourth quarter. The Titans took control of the game early, as Eddie George capped off an opening drive that spanned 11 plays and 58 yards with a two-yard touchdown run. Regardless of the final score, it was a dominant performance by the Tennessee defense, as they held the Ravens to six first downs, 134 total yards, and only five completions by Baltimore quarterback Trent Dilfer. Offensively, the Titans dominated Baltimore in first downs (23 to 6), rushing yards (126 to 49) and passing yards (191 to 85), but Baltimore's big plays were ultimately too much to overcome. The loss ended the Titans' reign as AFC Champions and their season at 13-4.

Wycheck and Erron Kinney each caught touchdown passes in the second half. Nedney's game-winner gave the Titans their first victory in four playoff games against Pittsburgh and propelled them into the AFC Championship Game at Oakland.

January 19, 2003 • Network Associates Stadium

The Raiders scored 14 unanswered points in the fourth quarter, closing out the Titans 41-24 to advance to Super Bowl XXXVII against Tampa Bay. Steve McNair's second rushing touchdown of the game pulled Tennessee within 27-24 at the end of the third quarter, but Rich Gannon scored on a 2-yard run and Zack Crockett added a 7-yard scoring run, ending a drive that consumed 6:29 on the clock late in the contest. The game's momentum changed before halftime when Oakland turned back-to-back fumbles by Tennessee into 10 points to close out the first half, taking a 24-17 lead at intermission. The Titans had scored 10 unanswered points to take their first lead of the game, 17-14, on McNair's 9-yard rushing touchdown. But a fumble by Robert Holcombe turned into a 1-yard touchdown pass from Gannon to Doug Jolley two plays later. Then John Simon fumbled the ensuing kickoff which Sebastian Janikowski turned into a 43-yard field goal as time expired at intermission.

NFL career scoring leader Gary Anderson kicked a 46-yard field goal with 29 seconds left after a courageous effort by a limping Steve McNair, giving the Titans a 20-17 victory in the first-round AFC Wild Card playoff game. McNair, named the league's co-MVP just 24 hours before kickoff, engineered an eight-play, 35-yard drive to set up the winning kick, and Eddie George finished with 88 yards on 25 carries, despite playing with a dislocated shoulder in the second half. In the process, Tennessee snapped a five-game losing streak against the Ravens. The Titans held 2003 NFL rushing champion Jamal Lewis to a season-low 35 yards. The Titans got the better of Ravens linebacker Ray Lewis, the AP NFL Defensive Player of the Year. George ran repeatedly at him all game, dispelling any myth that Lewis owned the 1-on-1 battle. The Titans took a 14-10 lead in the third quarter when McNair threw a 49-yard touchdown pass to Justin McCareins. Tennessee took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter on Chris Brown's first career touchdown from six yards out. The Titans held Lewis to 12 yards rushing on seven carries in the first half and outgained Baltimore 108-15 in the first quarter.

NFL co-MVP Steve McNair almost single-handedly took Tennessee downfield in the final minutes. But the man playing with a cracked bone spur in his left ankle saw his final pass fall in and out of the hands of Drew Bennett with 1:45 remaining in a 17-14 playoff loss to the eventual Super Bowl champion New England Patriots. The Titans (13-5) were trying to return to the AFC Championship for the third time in five seasons, and McNair nearly got them there. He tied the game with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Derrick Mason in the third quarter on a drive in which he was a perfect five of five for 59 yards. But the Titans came up just short on the final drive that included a pair of controversial calls against Tennessee. The game-time temperature at kickoff was four degrees with a wind-chill of minus 10. Winds were blowing at 10 mph. It marked the coldest game in both Patriots and Titans history. Rookie running back Chris Brown scored his second career touchdown – and second of the post-season – when he crossed the end zone from five yards out to tie the game at 7 in the first quarter.

A pair of Rob Bironas field goals and a defense that held San Diego to 94 first-half yards enabled the Titans to take a 6-0 halftime lead in their first playoff game in four years. But San Diego scored 17 unanswered points in the second half, exploding for 256 yards, in a 17-6 victory at Qualcomm Stadium. Running back LaDainian Tomlinson was held to 42 yards, but got to celebrate the first playoff victory in three tries in his brilliant career. The Titans bottled up Tomlinson, the two-time NFL rushing champion, and dared quarterback Philip Rivers to beat them. The second-year starter did just that, throwing a 25-yard touchdown pass to Vincent Jackson late in the third quarter that gave San Diego its first lead at 10-6. Tomlinson finally found the end zone midway through the fourth quarter on a fourth-down leap over the pile from inside the 1-yard line that survived a video replay. Tennessee's defense dominated in the first half, holding San Diego to just 10 total yards and without a first down in the first quarter.

The Titans were held without a sack for the first time since Week 8. It marked only the third time all season that the Titans did not force a turnover. Defensively, Tennessee held a Baltimore rushing attack averaging four yards-per-carry to 50 yards on 30 carries. Chris Johnson rushed for 72 yards in the first quarter before leaving the game with an injured ankle.

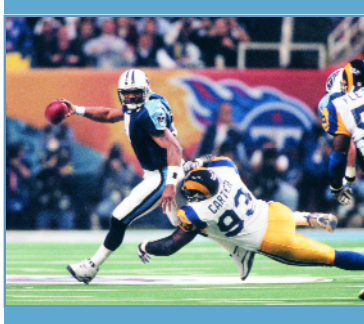
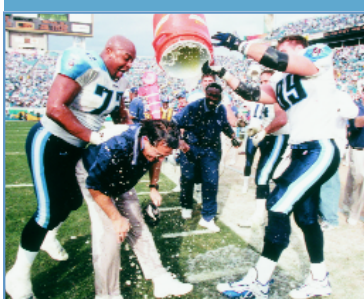
